



**1. General Weaver House**  
 102 Weaver Road - National Landmark designated home with distinctive Gothic style windows built for General James B. and Clara Weaver c. 1866.



**2. Greenleaf Place**  
 425 N. Madison St. - English Tudor style home with brick and oak trim, constructed in 1912 for Henry C. and Helen Steckel Taylor.



**3. Steckel House**  
 415 N. Madison St. - Colonial Revival facade constructed in 1910 for W.J. and Belle Steckel with arts and crafts interior personally designed by Gustave Stickley.



**4. Goode House**  
 402 Goode St. - Queen Anne inspired farmhouse built for L.E. and Rosy Goode in 1910.



**5. Standard Service Station**  
 601 W. Jefferson St. - Operated by the Pottorff family for 60 years, the station has been restored to its 1960's appearance. It opened as a private museum in 2018.



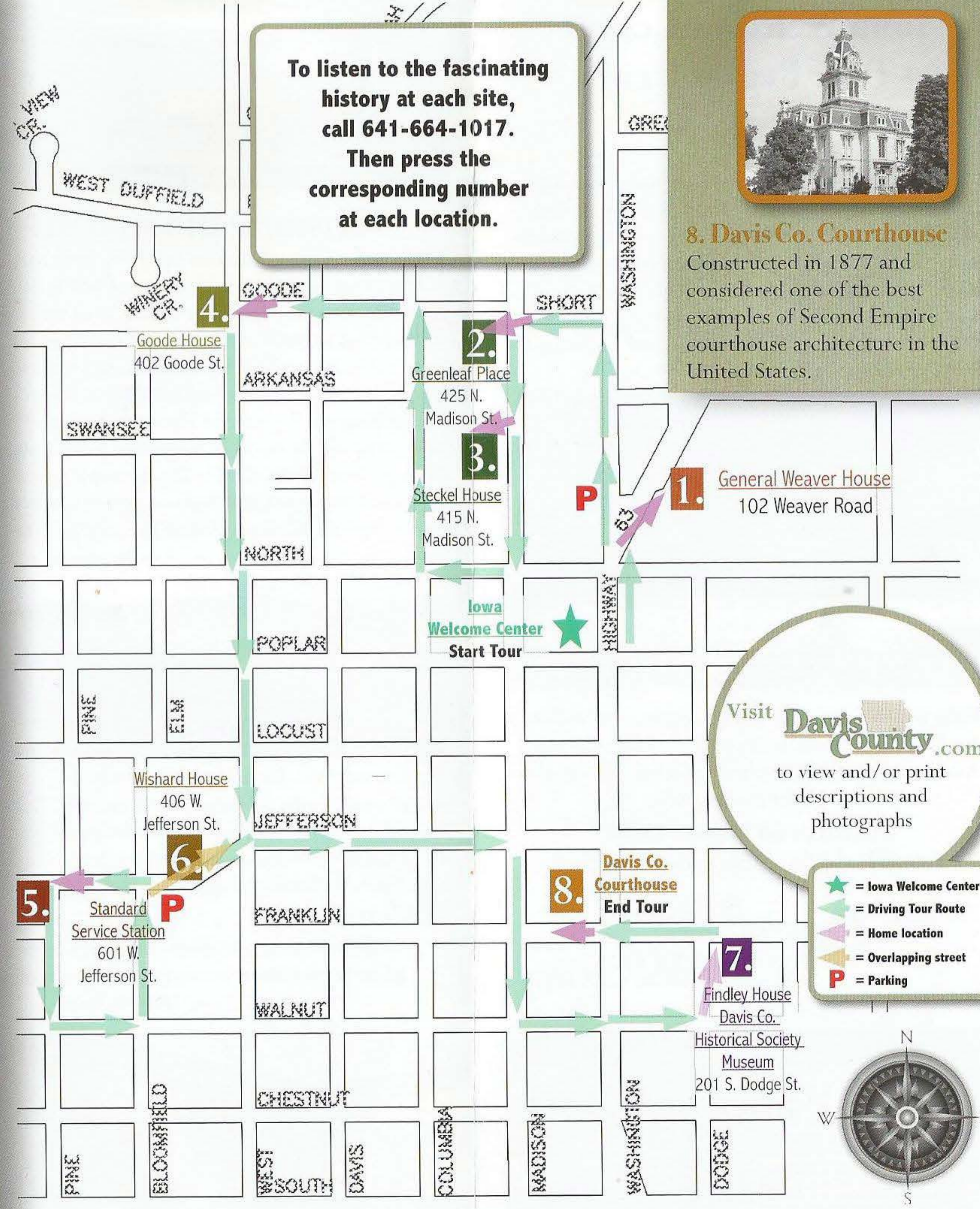
**6. Wishard House**  
 406 W. Jefferson St. - Late Victorian, Queen Anne style home built in 1908 for Henry Wishard.



**7. Findley House/Davis Co. Historical Society Museum**  
 201 S. Dodge St. - Built c. 1867 for pioneer physician and Civil War surgeon, Dr. William Findley.



**8. Davis Co. Courthouse**  
 Constructed in 1877 and considered one of the best examples of Second Empire courthouse architecture in the United States.
